Campau said she felt she would have been in good hands.

"I think it's ideal," Campau said. "I've never lived anywhere where they had a program like this."

The volunteers make about 30 to 40 calls a day. If no one answers, police are called to

have an officer go out to the home.

The program saves about two lives a year on average, Fish said.

Not all cases are that severe. Volunteer Geri Keenan recalled an elderly woman who fell and broke her heel. Keenan drove her to a doctor.

"This is your extended family," she said.

Because of his heart condition, Fish is now on the loner list himself.

"They always save my call for last," he said. "They give me a full report."

He still looks forward to making the calls every week. For Fish, it's a pleasure, not a job.

'My dream is still to be calling when I'm 100," he said.
